July 24th started corresponding, Aug 2 first meeting, we have had 3 additional meetings. **Keith** opened the meeting with a celebration of the clubs Veterans, thanking them for their service. Following are the stories that were shared by those members attending the meeting. The expose's are information I found on the intranet and may not be entirely accurate (because Wikipedia is not always known to be accurate). Also, with the acoustics in the restaurant and my less than perfect hearing, I may have reported some things incorrectly, please let me know and I will correct it in the January newsletter.







Marlon served in the Marine Corp. He and a third-grade buddy made a pact to join the Marine's when they grew up. When the guys graduated high school, his buddy asked Marlon if he remembered their pact to join the Marines? Marlon did not remember, but he said if they made a pact then he was going to keep his promise. Marlon was stationed in San Diego August 3, 1959 and served 7 years.

Marine Corps Recruit Depot (commonly referred to as MCRD) San Diego is a United States Marine Corps military installation in San Diego, California. It lies between San Diego Bay and Interstate 5, adjacent to San Diego International Airport and the former Naval Training Center San Diego.[3] MCRD San Diego's main mission is the initial training of enlisted male and female recruits living west of the Mississippi River. Over 21,000 recruits are trained each year. As of 2022, 1.5 million recruits have completed their boot camp training at the Depot.[4] The Depot also is the home to the Marine Corps' Recruiter School and Drill Instructors School.

Recruit training for those enlisted in the United States Marine Corps, includes a thirteen-week process during which the recruit becomes cut off from the civilian world and must adapt to a Marine Corps lifestyle. During training, drill instructors train recruits in a wide variety of subjects including weapons training, Marine Corps Martial Arts Program, personal hygiene and cleanliness, close order drill, and Marine Corps history. The training emphasizes physical fitness, and recruits must attain a minimum standard of fitness to graduate by passing a Physical Fitness Test. Recruits must also meet minimum combat-oriented swimming qualifications, qualify in rifle marksmanship with the M16A4 service rifle, and pass a 54-hour simulated combat exercise known as "The Crucible".





Elaine's father, Gaylen Rydelis, served in the Army and received the Bronze Star.

The Bronze Star Medal (BSM) is a United States Armed Forces decoration awarded to members of the United States Armed Forces for either heroic achievement, heroic service, meritorious achievement, or meritorious service in a combat zone.

Keith's brother was a Veteran from the First Infintry in Viet Nam



The 1st Infantry Division, aka Big Red One, continued their storied history in the US Army with participation in Vietnam. In 1965, they were the first divisional unit deployed with the 2nd Brigade doing the honors in July. Their sector and command was known as III Corps and they engaged Viet Cong (VC) and regular North Vietnamese Army (NVA) forces in the jungles northwest of Saigon to the Cambodian border. Many battles occurred along the Highway 13 corridor and various spurs North-Northwest of Saigon on the road to An Loc.

During the enemy Tet Offensive of 1968, the 1st Infantry Division secured the Tan Son Nhut Airbase the primary hub for air operations within all of Vietnam. They returned to their home at Fort Riley, Kansas in 1970.



Julie's father was in the Navy. She flew his flag in the Oakdale Veteran's parade. Keith's father made topographic maps for the military, he was not enlisted and worked out of Washington D.C.



The term topography originated in ancient Greece and continued in ancient Rome, as the detailed description of a place. The word comes from the Greek  $\tau \acute{o}\pi o \varsigma$  (topos, "place") and  $-\gamma \rho \alpha \phi \acute{l}\alpha$  (-graphia, "writing").[3] In classical literature this refers to writing about a place or places, what is now largely called 'local history'. In Britain and in Europe in general, the word topography is still sometimes used in its original sense.[4]

Detailed military surveys in Britain (beginning in the late eighteenth century) were called Ordnance Surveys, and this term was used into the 20th century as generic for topographic surveys and maps.[5] The earliest scientific surveys in France were called the Cassini maps after the family who produced them over four generations. citation needed The "topographic surveys" appears to be American in origin. The earliest detailed surveys in the United States were made by the "Topographical Bureau of the Army", formed during the War of 1812,[6] which became the Corps of Topographical Engineers in 1838.[7] After the work of national mapping was assumed by the U.S. Geological Survey in 1878, the term topographical remained as a general term for detailed surveys and mapping programs, and has been adopted by most other nations as standard.



Jim M., father served in the Army







Jim R. served in the Army Reserve from 1978-1984 at the Military Training Command in Pleasanton California



Camp Parks, home of the Army's 91st Division, and part of the U.S. Army Combat Support Training Center at Fort Hunter Liggett, is located in the eastern reaches of the San Francisco Bay Area near the City of Livermore, California in Alameda County. The Parks Reserve Forces Area, historically known as Camp Parks, is located in the city of Dublin, California, 28 miles Southeast of Oakland.

Camp Parks services more than 250 units with more than 20,000 Army Reserve and National Guard Soldiers in the greater San Francisco area.

Camp Parks' assets include a Rappel Tower, Leadership Reaction Course, state-of-the-art Medical Skills Lab, and a Distance Learning Center equipped with 24 computers, and bed space for more than 800. The facility was built during World War II and was commissioned 19 January 1943 as Camp Parks.


Originally, it was home to the Navy Seabees then transferred to the Air Force who establishing a basic training center during the Korean War and renamed the facility Parks Air Force Base.

In July 1959, the installation was transferred to the United States Army and In 1973, the Army determined that Camp Parks was needed as a mobilization and training center for Reserve Components in the event of war or natural disaster.

Thousands of National Guard and Army Reserve Soldiers—and 94 Naval Reserve Seabees' train for war at Camp Parks. One occupant, 1st Brigade of the 91st Division trains Army units using computer simulators.

The base supports some 11,000 San Francisco Bay Area Army Reserve and California National Guard Soldiers from 180 units.







Ken Van Dyke served in the Army National Guard, Orange CA. He was denied entry to the service, because he was married and had children. Not long after the family relocated from Southern California to Oakdale, Ken received a phone call. Ken asked Roberta where his discharge papers were. She said, "Why do you need your discharge papers?" Ken said, "Because they're coming to arrest me for being AWOL!" She said, "I don't know, probably out in those unpacked boxes!" There they went digging through boxes looking for Ken's DD214 so he would not be arrested. That was the first of many erroneous encounters with the other Ken Van Dyke in Oakdale! The armory is now used for public service and slated to be a historical landmark.





Donna Montavon's father was an Air Force Fighter Pilot. He flew P-51's and shot down two enemy aircraft.



The North American P-51 Mustang represents the pinnacle of American aviation development during World War 2. The aircraft is a remarkable testament to the rapid progression of American WW2 planes from the unreliable and underpowered early WW2 fighters dubbed flying coffins. This North American Aviation WWII fighter was conceived as a British fighter for the Royal Air Force RAF and manufactured under license from Curtiss Wright Corporation. Fortunately, the proposal was scrapped, and a more modern design was approved.

The P-51 Mustang had the shortest development period compared to other World War planes, and it would go on to be among the most produced planes in WW2. The P-51 filled a gaping hole left by existing American WWII fighters operating in the European theater by providing much-needed long-range escorts to allied bomber missions across Europe. The aircraft's combination of speed, maneuverability, and long-range operation devastated the indomitable Luftware fighting force. It shattered German illusions of European hegemony and hastened the end of the war in Europe by opening up the skies to allied aircraft. Perhaps, the best validation of the P-51 absolute air supremacy was Hermann Göring, commander of the Luftwaffes' famous statement, "When I saw Mustangs over Berlin, I knew the jig was up."



Jan's father was in the Navy, submarine division. In WWII he was stationed in Australia where he met Jan's mother Audrey. Her dad was punished and spent 30 days away from his new bride. His family received the news of his marriage and weren't sure if he was bringing home an Aborigine or an Aussie! Jan probably wouldn't be here If it weren't for the war and the Navy!



World War II submarine bases were established in both Brisbane and Fremantle in 1942. The U.S. submarines, which fell back on Australia in early 1942, were the remnants of the Asiatic Fleet Submarine Force. They were literally on the front line of the Pacific War with the Japanese occupying the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia).


From 1943 to 1945 Fremantle based boats sank over 273,000 tons of enemy tankers as well as 19 destroyers, 16 frigates, 4 minesweepers, 9 submarine chasers and 6 patrol craft. From 1942-45 354 patrols were undertaken and 11 boats were lost. Western Australia based submarines completed only 22 percent of the total Pacific submarine war patrols but they accounted for 38 percent of the Japanese oil tanker tonnage sunk. That the Fremantle boats could maintain such an offensive against Japanese oil supplies attests not only to the strategic situation of Fremantle but also to the technical efficiency of the base. The high morale of the crews who lived and relaxed among the people of Albany, Fremantle and Perth between patrols was a significant factor, borne out by the many enduring friendships and marriages which ensued.
